

Everything New?!

Merry Advent! Yes, by the time you get this newsletter it will be a different church season. Finally? The beginning of a new church year. Really? And the beginning of getting closer to Christmas. Only four more weeks (or so)!

As I write this message, I am feeling a bit confused about what season we are in. The weather outside is finally turning colder like it should be in fall, whether we like it or not. We are getting close to the Thanksgiving holiday, which in the US is rather late for a

harvest celebration. But then I've already heard Christmas music, seen store shelves change with the latest season's decorations, and homes are aglow with lights.

I don't know about you, sometimes it can seem like the church is out of sync with the world, but then I think it's a good thing that the church offers an alternative perspective that's more timeless than what's trending around us.

The recent election outcome showed that popular opinion can sway rather quickly and in ways that may or may not be good for us (all of us, not just for those whose candidate won). And I had to be reminded that God, our Christian faith, and the church offer us something that goes beyond individual preferences, political programs, or majority rule. It's the timeless message that God loves everyone, that Christ died for everyone, that the Spirit gives hope for the present and future to everyone.

We read in the letter to the Hebrew Christians who needed some faith reminders: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever! Don't be misled by the many strange teachings out there." (Hebrews 13:8-9, CEB)

As we are approaching the end of the year 2024 and the coming of the new year, let's not forget that the good news of Jesus is more dependable than a lot of other messages out there. And while our faith may seem strange to people, it is what can keep us steady in the midst of changes.

What do you enjoy about the different holidays? What do you wish could stay the same? And what would you like to change in your life, in the church, and in our world? May Jesus, whose birth made everything new, grant us serenity to accept what cannot be changed, courage to work for changing the things we can, and the wisdom of knowing the difference.

Christmas Eve CANDLELIGHT SERVICE

Our candlelight Christmas Eve service will take place on Tuesday, December 24 at 8pm, with special music from our vocal and handbell choirs. It will be a royal celebration of a "Royal Birth" for common people like us living ordinary lives (albeit in extraordinary times).

Additional HIGHLIGHTS IN WORSHIP

The season of *Advent* includes four Sundays and is a time of preparation for the coming of Christ. During that period, we learn and practice how to welcome our saving Lord in our lives today but also at the end of time when he will make everything new in his kingdom of eternal peace.

- + The season of *Advent* begins on Sunday, <u>December 1</u> and continues through the 22nd until Christmas Eve. We light an additional candle each Sunday on a wreath to indicate the coming of the light of the world on Christmas Day.
 - At home you might light your wreath or simply light a candle while you use or share a weekly devotion provided by Global Health Ministries this year.
 It is emailed to members and available on paper upon request.

In the meantime, *Christmas* helps us to celebrate that Jesus' birth already brought us forgiveness and hope of new beginnings each day through his death and resurrection.

+ On the Sunday between Christmas and New Year's Eve, <u>December 29</u>, we'll be reminded that Christ is always with us in Spirit, and learn how prayer can help us renew our *Christian Discipleship* when faith and its practice has become worn out.

After the short 12-day season of Christmas, we join the shepherds and wise men (and women?!) after the *Epiphany* in bringing the good news of God's gift of salvation with our neighbors near and far through personal witness and church ministries for relief, development, and advocacy.

- + Our celebration of *Epiphany Sunday*, on <u>January 5</u> (the actual day is always the 6th), is a reminder that Christ was born to bring the good news of God's reign of justice and peace for everyone in the whole world.
 - During the following season of mission emphasis, we are all sent anew to bless others and invite them to join our community of faith, hope, and love.
- + On Sunday, <u>January 12</u>, the church celebrates the <u>Baptism of our Lord</u> as God's confirmation of Jesus' beginning of his ministry. We will affirm our own baptism with a commitment to discipleship and mission.



Your Personal ADVENT DEVOTIONAL

This year, we are sharing a weekly Advent Devotional from Global Health Ministries for your personal use. "Christmas in the Neighborhood" offers Scripture reflections written by Bible scholar Walter Brueggemann, who invites us to see with God's eyes. Each week provides a prayer and includes an example of neighborly care provided by compassionate Christians.

wellness ministry The PEACE *Full* wellness ministry celebrates community in wholesome, healthy, and mindful activities for all ages. Our intent is to invite greater peace and health into our lives through meditation, movement, and mindfulness.

- Sunday, December 8, 4:30-6pm: <u>Starry Night Chair Yoga + Meditation</u> Embrace the symbolism of the Star of Bethlehem in this gentle flow and inspiring meditation.
- Sunday, January 5, 4:30-6pm: <u>Mindfulness Workshop</u>
 Learn the core principles of mindfulness and how to cultivate a healthy mindset daily. Engage in mindful breathing, body scanning and learn powerful tools to manage stress, anxiety, and negative thought patterns
- + Sunday, January 19, 4:30-6pm: <u>Speaking Truth Chair Yoga + Meditation</u>
 Lean into the grace of expressing, let go of being restrictive and critical.

 Discover how to eradicate harshness and embrace ease. This class will show you how to release the shoulders, jaw, and throat and bring more kindness to yourself and others.

All classes and workshops are suitable for all ages, abilities and complete beginners! Classes are fun, encouraging and are designed to reduce tension, increase energy levels and improve mobility and sleep.

Duration: 60-90 minutes of gentle movement and sitting on a chair in meditation

What to bring: please wear comfortable clothing, a water bottle and an open heart! Whether you are seeking a gentle way to stay physically active or a peaceful moment of mindfulness our classes offer a balanced blend of movement and relaxation.


impacted by poverty and hunger, and you show others that you care about the well-being of people in need. It's a win-win approach to gift giving.

Blood Pressure Checks and Wellness Information

Lew McDonald takes blood pressures and provides information at church before and after worship, usually on the first Sunday of each month. Check in with Lew on Dec. 1 and Jan. 5, and thank him for his ministry. This month, Lew shares How to Understand the Bible (adapted from The Good News at UCG.org):

- Pray for understanding. (Luke 24:44-45)
- Keep an open mind. (Acts 17:11)

Parish

- Humbly seek instruction and correction. (Isaiah 66:2)
- Accept the inspiration of the Bible. (2 Peter 1:21)
- Plan time for regular study. (Ephesians 5:15-17)
- Let the Bible interpret itself. (Isaiah 28:10)
- Study all topics. Concentrate on one subject, doctrine, or book at a time.
- Read the whole Bible. Ensure seeing all of the Bible, often.
- Compare different translations many.
- Use study aids. Caution, they are not Scripture, and can be wrong.
- Ask for guidance from God's church. (Romans: 10:14-15)
- Take notes, to help you remember.
- Review and meditate. (Psalm 2)
- Obey God's Word and prove it true. His Word endures forever.
- Hold fast. (1 Thessalonians 5:21)

Faithful Innovation


1. Listening to God

Our Faithful Innovation team is learning to listen to God and our community in order to help our entire congregation learn how to share our faith and explore opportunities for outreach for service and invitation.

The first step is regular practice of **Dwelling in the Word**. The first Bible passage we are invited to hear is Acts 16:6-15. (Use the NIV translation or any that's available to you). Read the text out loud and slowly once, and after pausing, a second time. Then, discern three questions by yourself or share reflections with others:

- + What caught my attention?
- What question would I want to ask?
- + What am I hearing God say (what might the Spirit nudge me/us to)? Repeat this practice with the same text once a week or so, and use it with others at church, in your home, or good friends.

The Guiding Team of Pastor Stefan, Lori Evans, Erin Landers, and Diane Singler is practicing the listening and community survey step together and with a synod mentor. On December 7, the team will attend the second of three day-long training sessions to learn about the second step of trying out new things. Stay tuned as we will share experiences and invite you to learn for discipleship and mission with us.




